Our significant investment of time and resources in program development and evaluation has positioned us as a nationally-recognized leader in prevention curriculum development, professional training, and thought leadership.

Not only did we develop the first evidence-base curriculum from New Jersey to be listed on the National Registry of Effective Programs and Practices (the preeminent registry in the country), we helped create what will be the second, and we are already working with the federal government on what will be the third. We are also the only company (for-profit or non-profit) in the country, and perhaps the world, to undertake the development of an online platform for the full curriculum of courses necessary to become licensed or certified as an addiction counselor. Our courses are approved in every state, all branches of the military, and 22 countries across multiple disciplines.

The year 2020 will always reflect the core of all we do – our commitment to leadership, innovation, quality, and empathy – and will provide the roots to anchor us to the history and the vision that will guide us into the future.

# OUR EDUCATIONAL/PREVENTION EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Wellspring offers programs and services throughout Middlesex County and parts of Monmouth County NJ that reach across the age continuum. From prenatal education to healthy aging, we partner with organizations from all segments of society to build healthy communities.

We are especially proud of the work done by Wellspring staff adapting to all of the challenges brought on by COVID-19. Our in-person lessons were halted, but that did not mean we stopped working with our students and communities. As we found ourselves in the new normal of 100% virtual, we changed our approach. We were able to handle the majority of our school programs through real time lessons on platforms like ZOOM, Google Meets, and TEAMS.

This took a lot of planning and coordination to deliver programming on these varied platforms. Staff would practice with each other and troubleshoot issues that could possibly impact our program delivery. When issues did come up during classroom time, we were able to remedy them quickly.

For the schools that could not accommodate real time lessons, Wellspring staff recorded themselves teaching lessons which were then sent to teachers to be incorporated into their school day. Recording and editing of each video took place after these meetings. This was a huge undertaking, but Wellspring staff were able to navigate the new programming formats and get the programs out to the schools that needed them.

Wellspring was able to complete the majority of our education programs despite being faced with the challenges of the pandemic. Our relationship with school districts was pivotal in our ability to continue doing the work we love. Teachers were excited to see our faces in their virtual classrooms, and students were happy to see a "new" face on their screen. Truth be told, we are not sure who was more excited, the youth or Wellspring Staff!

#### **OUR SCHOOL-BASED CLINICAL SERVICES**

Wellspring Center for Prevention provides school based clinical services in Carteret and South Plainfield. This programming initiated in 2006 when the agency collaborated with Carteret School District to create Pathways School Based Youth Services Program (SBYSP) a comprehensive prevention and mental health treatment program in Carteret High School.

The mission of Pathways was to address all the needs of the students of Carteret High School so that when they were in the classroom, they could focus on learning. While our commitment to Carteret High School remains strong and the program flourishes there, Wellspring has now created a school based clinical services division within the agency which encompasses an expansion into additional schools. During this past year, Wellspring provided school based clinical services in six schools including elementary, middle and high school in Carteret and South Plainfield High School where the program is known as The Path. We are looking to expand these services to other districts in Middlesex County in 2021.

Wellspring's school-based clinical services provides custom-tailored, collaborative, school-based programs that offer the best of mental health and supportive counseling, structured recreation, psycho-education, and skill-building, in a non-stigmatizing school-based environment. All services can be custom-tailored to each schools' learning environment and the students' needs.

Our efforts are designed around collaboration with the school district's practices and on-site support services to ensure a seamless, barrier-free environment to care. Each program is staffed by professionals experienced in youth development, mental health counseling, and case management backed by Wellspring's mission to help educators focus on their youth and foster and develop healthy minds and healthy bodies.

Additional services include direct linkage to licensed and accredited community-based programs through Wellspring; educational workshops for faculty and parents; direct in-class support for students and teachers; collaborations with the school team and outpatient resources; partnerships with child study teams as indicated by IEPs; case management; parent support groups; positive recreation programs, summer programs and transitional programs to assist students with school and grade level changes.

## Program Highlights

- 849 unduplicated youth served in individual, family or group services (excludes events, i.e. SEL for all students, assemblies, classroom activities etc.)
- 406 unduplicated students provided individual counseling
- 2207 individual counseling sessions delivered
- 599 unduplicated students participated in group
- 80 events provided with over 15,000 student contacts

#### Notable activities

- Creation of a Virtual Calm Room
- Use of Google Classroom to reach kids with over 400 Carteret Middle School members
- Provided Social Emotional Learning sessions school wide either weekly or monthly to elementary, middle and high school students in Carteret Middle School
- Signs of Suicide Curriculum delivered in health classes at CMS
- Creation of a virtual Pride Library for Carteret Elementary School
- Creation of a Pathways QR code for students to access services, learn about programming, get resources etc.
- Started an Incorruptible Us chapter with great success
- Started a Letters for Rose chapter

A great deal of effort and time was devoted to advocacy activities to fight the proposed DCF defunding of the School Based Youth Services.

This was a coordinated effort with all 91 school-based programs and involved regular meetings, legislative advocacy, a virtual rally, an in-person rally, letter writing and a great deal of media coverage. These efforts proved to be successful and we were notified that all of the funding would be reinstated as of Oct 1, 2020. This effort was extremely successful in not only getting services fully refunded as of October 2020, but in raising awareness of School Based services throughout the state. In fact, this year's state budget saw an increase in School Based funding.

### **2020 AGENCY HIGHLIGHTS**

Wellspring created virtual presentations for Strengthening Families, HealthEASE, WISE and Take Control of Your Health lessons. All 6 Footprints for Life lessons have been filmed and distributed to schools. WNBI program was made into Google docs and sent to schools to complete the lessons started before the schools closed down. Life Skills Training lessons were filmed and sent to schools. Agencies that purchased licenses for FFL and WNBI received Wellspring materials to continue their lessons virtually.

- SBIRT (Screening Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment) Trainings were delivered to staff at RWJ/BH.
- Wellspring staff was able to judge Middlesex County's Distracted Driving PSA Contest virtually.
- Students from the South Brunswick "Incorruptible US" group were awarded \$3500 in funding from Hackensack-Meridian to do awareness in their school regarding vaping; a summer kick-off event was planned.
- Coalition meetings continued virtually on a monthly basis; other virtual events held included our annual Older Adult Conference, CADC and CPS classes, Town Hall Meeting presentations on underage drinking, vaping and social media held at several local libraries via Zoom. Collaboration with North Brunswick and Metuchen Libraries continued throughout the end of summer, and will continue through the fall.
- Leadership training provided to 45 Dunellen HS students.
- A virtual cycle of Take Control of Your Health was completed for Silver Linings in Perth Amboy and a second cycle using self-paced program was delivered in Sayreville.
- Professional development presentation made to 154 staff at Keyport School District.

### **2020 AGENCY HIGHLIGHTS**

- Staff made 13 live virtual presentations for the whole freshman class of Freehold Boro High School.
- Freehold Boro School District staff and administrators received professional development presentations
- Red Ribbon Week efforts held in collaboration with several schools and community organizations including South Brunswick HS (where approximately 200 students participated in a Red Ribbon Week trivia event); Wardlaw-Hartridge, Mobile Family Success Center; North Brunswick Library;
- Professional development training was delivered to 24 staff at the MC Vocational/Technical HS: a program on Mindfulness and Self-Care was delivered to staff at Piscataway HS: presentation to ASAP (Assn. of Student Assistance Professionals on How Media Influences Youth. Half-day conference for educators scheduled for 12/15.
- Our 4th Annual Senior Conference was held December 14th; program was presented virtually.
- Carteret accepted classroom programming for Footprints for Life; 18 classroom programs (started in-person; switched to live via Zoom) were scheduled.
- Panel for Rutgers Pharmacy students on Covid and Addiction/Trends
- Professional development presentation made to 100 Freehold Boro HS staff
- Presented to all Monmouth Regional Staff(147) Trauma Informed Teaching
- Presentation to all 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students in Marlboro Middle School & Marlboro Memorial Middle School


